Having now been in the music business for over 40 years, JEFFERY ALLEN SPENCE began his professional career at the age of 15 playing in successful jazz trios, serving as pianist in the Bill Causey Orchestra (Shreveport La) and big band arranger for the Louisiana pageant system. During his high school years he was music director for numerous theatrical productions (i.e. Oklahoma) and leading his own jazz/rock performance groups.

After high school, he studied music, languages and theology at 6 different universities which included jazz studies programs at Loyola University New Orleans and University of New Orleans where he studied piano under Ellis Marsalis.

In the late 70's he toured the world with a touring band from Oral Roberts University, Living Sound. This stint included playing such high profile gigs as Shea Stadium (40,000 ppl) and European events.

During the 80's Jeffery acted as piano conductor for Fiesta Texas (San Antonio, Gaylord Entertainment), orchestrated for Miss America, Cheryl Pruitt Blackwood and pianist duties for the traveling Broadway cast of Ain't Misbehavin' (Strand Theatre)

He has performed with such artists as Brook Benton, Jimmy Witherspoon, Marva Wright, Brian Blade, Everett Harp and has opened for such groups as Spyro Gyra and the Neville Brothers. After establishing his show on Bourbon St., (New Orleans) Jeff did his first recording "Rockin Louisiana Man" for Rabadash Records of New Orleans and was later picked up by BMG Europe. This success prompted many European and Canadian tours.

Having honed his music and comedic entertainment skills on Bourbon Street, Jeff has entertained thousands on cruise Lines (Norweigan, Carnival and Holland America Lines) and resorts around the world. He also performed his musical comedy show over 20 years for Hilton Palacio Del Rio on the Riverwalk in San Antonio.

In the last 10 years, Jeff's focus has been on Personal Empowerment and Recovery related entertainment events. His newly recorded cds include Piano Calm (relaxation cd) and Positively Swing! of which a multi-media show integrating Positivity and Swing music has been created. In the last few years, Jeffery opened GratitudeRoad Recording Studios where he produces CD projects and empowerment oriented television.

Jeffery is currently producing his original song CD entitled "Gratitunes", presenting his Gratitude Science based corporate seminar "Great Gobs of Gratitude" and hosting his interview and music shows "Empowerment Today" and "Recovery Empowerment Tonight" to networks nationwide.

Currently a member of The Los Angeles Writers Center, Riqué's destiny was cemented with his debut in the Children's Chorus of "La Boheme" with Met Opera star Paul Plishka. Between those bookends, Rique's journey has included stints at The Nashville Repertory Theatre, featured roles in Independent films and made for TV Movies, a co starring role in the hit series "Nashville" and a recurring role in the series "Get Thee Behind Me". 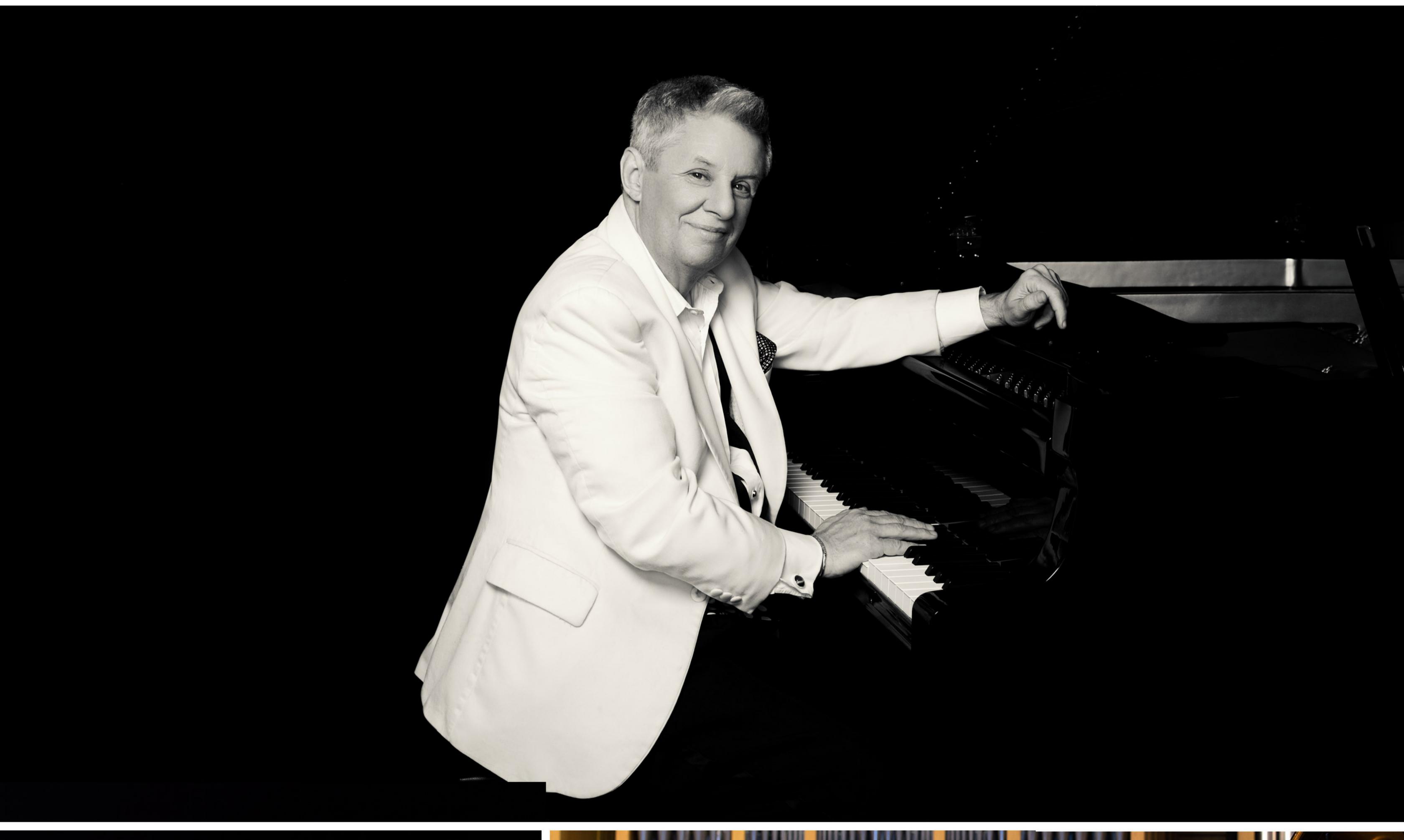

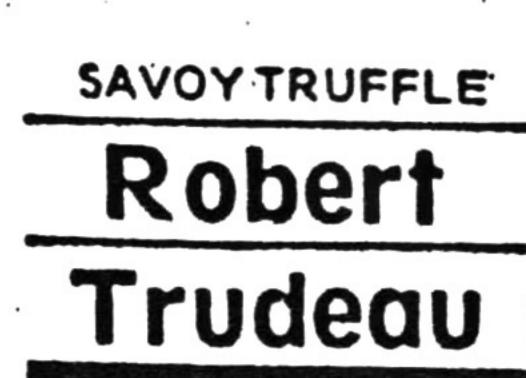
Here's what he had going last week besides the jazz jam: an organizational meeting of the Friends of Jazz, the debut of the Spence-organized band Blues Plus, and about ten solo piano sessions for places like the Radisson and the Cambridge Club.

For some eight years Spence worked the Christian music scene from Houston to Tulsa. He toured Europe and Mexico with various Christian bands, worked for churches and taught music for Christian colleges.

As did a number of successful musicians, he got his basic knowledge in Shreveport as a teen; he worked in Bill Causey-led big bands and played trombone for the Parkway High symphonic band. At age 15, he was able to start writing stage band charts for beauty contests, he remembers.

Iwo years ago he returned to secular music, forming a fusion band to play the Aid Station Marina and gigging in Houston with a hot lounge band. Back here he hooked up with Kimberlei Bradford to do contemporary hits both with a battery of synthesizers and with a band. Most recently he had a duo act in Florida.

His newest creation, Blues Plus, is one of the strongest R & B acts ever assembled in this town. There's no better singer in the area than Marvin



Seals. Bassist Mike Parks has played for all the town's best bands (A Train, Stage 618, etc.) Brady Blade, formerly with Late Show and the Killer Bees, has a big sound and even bigger personality. Darryl Mims, guitar, vocals and flute, is the least celebrated member of the group, yet he has played with numerous blues and contemporary acts, notably with Freddie Pierson and at the Glass Hat. He has also done a half hour of his own songs for Cablevision.

Seals, 37, was raised near one of the great Mississippi River-bank blues towns, Osceola, Ark. It's some 50 miles north of Memphis and is most famous for producing Albert King and Son Seals. Marvin is of the same Seals family, but he was one of the runts. Born premature and with seriously impaired sight, he debuted, he says, as a church of blues bands, notably as Albert King's drummer for two years and as leader of his own band, Little Marvin and the Outcasts.

Still, Spence handled his chores as central player well, and the crowd responded, applauding and laughing in a spontaneous fashion that was more than polite. The crowd was enjoying itself and the show — the best mark of success for any production.

Spence, who plays New Orleans piano styles ranging from Dr. John to Allen Toussaint to Harry Connick Jr., now plays solo at the Mardi Gras restaurant, 16668 San Pedro Ave., Monday through Thursday from 6 to 10 p.m. and with the Bourbon Street Band Friday and Saturday from 7 to 11 p.m.

Spence recently finished his end of a new album and is waiting for the post-production part of the project to come together. Few things can make motion and emotion work together like piano music from New Orleans, and we're fortunate to have Spence in the vicinity.

#### It's Mardi Gras time as the Big Easy comes to Crawley

FOR starters the venue is surreal a marquee in the grounds of the Hawth Threatre at Crawley where we sit around bare tables with the bar over the road in the main theatre building.

And there is something bizarre about the line up the band that takes the stage this evening; a tall, bony, grey haired lead guitarist whose gaunt face seems perpetually stalked by worry; a



muscular black drummer; a finely featured bass player who sports a F... The Law T-shirt that will become a talking point later in the show; and a Scottish keyboardist, Louis O'Neill, who drinks and chain smokes his way through the evening and who carries the air of a lunatic Billy Connolly in his every gesture.

Before they even strike a note, Jeff Spence's backing band look interesting. And there is the man himself, fresh off a plane from The Big Easy, who brings to this marquee beneath the trees some of the music of his native New Orleans.

But Jeff Spence is no

classy Bourbon Street lounge piano player. Suddenly, bursting upon those of us who did not know what to expect is an off-the-wall loony, clorm-like figure who appears to busk his way through the night, but instead is on a planned roll as fast and as wide as the Mississippi.

stoien sices of the lunacy and frenetic energy of Jerry Lee Lewis and Little Richard and rammed them into a pint-sized personality that grows larger as the gig wears on.

The Rockin Louisana man sets out to rattle the tent poles with his own brand of inspired

humour and music and he does it with the desirable quality of being able to laugh at himself.

He is a clown prince of Basin Street, one minute rasping like Louis Armstrong, the next wringing the blues out of his smoky voice.

And when he's not belting the keyboard he's either letting rip with a slide trombone, wrestling an accordion into a foot-stomping Cajun number or contorting his face and gingers on the fretboard of a Strat as he jams with the band in a blues song off the CD he constantly and unash amedly plugs throughout the gig.

You don't get slick sugar coated professionalism with Jess Spence. You get a lot of laughs - he likes to treat his concerts like a night down at the pub-nd you start worrying that he might fall off the stage or bump his

face on the mic. You also chortle at his outrageous dress sense,
plastic beads around
his neck, plastic earring and horrible loudpyjama style trousers,
but you get up at the
end and follow him
around the tent as he
blasts out When The
Saints Go Marching In
on the trombone.

You get carried away

when Jeff Spence throws a 100mp! party and you hear some of the sounds of Bourbon Street and the Bayou and the jaz and blues that made The Big Easy famous And you thunder for more from a larger than life personality who is also one hell of a singer and musician. No one really wants this shindig to come to an end!

And you go home clutching your copy of his highly publicised CD, disappointed to learn that you will have to wait for a year for the next mini Mardi Gras to explode in a marquee in Grawicy, and wondering why Spence isn't an international star.

#### Circle Players opens 67th season with 'Jesus Christ Superstar'; solid performances highlight legendary soundtrack

Last weekend, Circle Players opened their 67th season with "Jesus Christ Superstar". When I spoke with director Jason Lewis and cast members for one of my latest Rapid Fire 20 Q prior to their Friday, August 12 opening, there was an indication from Lewis that this "Superstar" had been brought into the modern age with mention of the current Syrian refugee crisis and hot button issues like political terrorism and religious turmoil. While I appreciate Lewis' thought process and creativity involved in adding his own touches to the iconic 1970s rock opera, I couldn't help thinking those updates and references are unnecessary. After all, why mess with perfection? After attending opening weekend, I'm happy to report that fans of the work can rest assured that the legendary soundtrack courtesy of Sir Andrew Lloyd Webber and Sir Tim Rice is still what makes Circle Players' "Jesus Christ Superstar" a spectacular night of theatre.



"That leaves Riqué. While Riqué no longer calls Nashville home, to those who know him, he'll always be a Nashvillian. Currently residing in Los Angeles, "Superstar" marks a homecoming of sorts in that years ago he was among Circle Players' cast of "Pippin". In "Superstar", Riqué plays not one, not two, but three roles. At various times, he is featured as Philip, one of Jesus' apostles, then alongside the aforementioned Brian Jones and Larry Jones as one of the Priests (during which he maintains a stoic exterior in spite of the best efforts of the happy-go-lucky flock. But it's his Trump-tastic turn as King Herod that'll keep audiences buzzing. Director Lewis' decision to poke fun at The Donald during "King Herod's Song/Try it and See" isn't anything revolutionary. I've seen productions that roasted everyone from Ronald Reagan to Ed Koch. That said, Riqué's Herod as Trump, complete with backup dancers, that somehow conjures the showmanship of Robert Preston and the comedic timing of Martin Short, is a much-needed laugh, given the turn of events it sandwiches within the contest of the play."
